## President's Message

I spoke with members of the Nominating Committee after they recommended a slate for election at the October meeting. I want to thank them for their service as well as the 2006-07 Board, which will have its final meeting on November 13. Some board members will recycle into the 2008-09 Board and some will take a deserved rest until the society calls upon them again in the future.

**Tennis Maynard** told me that soliciting members to serve as officers and trustees on the next board was a labor of Hercules. We all need to thank those who when asked to serve were able to reply "Yes." I was told that many of you wanted very much to accept invitations but were forced to decline. Has life become so hectic and overcrowded? If so, maybe we need our orchids more than we ever suspected to keep us grounded.

In the past two years we have made a conscious effort to downsize the work required to keep the society operating and beneficial to you while not burning out our volunteer labor base. I know we've succeeded with the newsletter editor job ... and in the process of decreasing the burden on **Bill** by going all electronic, we've wound up with one of the best orchid society newsletters in the country. Another killer job is away show chair. I was told that the nominating committee wanted to make **Naila** a trustee and give her a rest from the away show job before she suffered a meltdown. No takers and Naila bravely re-upped. But as I mentioned at the September meeting, we will take serious steps to reduce the size of that job and generate help too. For starters, we intend to cover as many shows as practical but our goal is to enter exhibits that take half an hour to set up or tear down. That means (1) all table-top (2) the plants and props must fit in the back seat of a standard sedan, so (3) we'll select something on the order of the best 8 plants to be taken to an away show, but (4) those who want their plants shown when they weren't selected may drive them to/from the away show and we'll fit them into the exhibit ... no hard feelings but this decision is not against anyone's plants but is instead in favor of the setup person. The home show chair job has been helped by our use of plant registration software we've received from **Jim McCullough** whom we know from the Cincinnati Judging Center. (Even though we've been using that software for several years now, it behooves us to make sure that a number of you learn how to use it for the sake of continuity.) We have also smoothed out this job by delegating a big chunk of it to a Volunteer Coordinator who has assisted the home show chair for the past couple years. And we will keep looking for new ways to use the computer to help the show chair. On the back-burner are good intentions to streamline the treasurer's and membership director's jobs.

Now to change topics, our Fall Mini Show and Orchid Sale is right around the corner. We have to talk about this now because the November newsletter will be too late as this show and sale is always held on the first weekend of November. We will have a member's plant sales table. We will sell your excess divisions and seedlings and whatever for our standard 20% commission. But if you are selling more than 20 plants, we want you to take your own sales table, which we will provide for a flat \$50 fee, no commissions due. If the number of volunteers helping out is sufficient, we will try to provide some coverage for your sales table when you are away for lunch or whatever. An exhibit is not necessary to getting a sales table but is encouraged. And to show

that our heart is in the right place, we are discouraging floor displays, (probably) will not provide our stanchions and black cloth backdrops, and will encourage you to enter small table-top exhibits. Everyone is encouraged to do that whether they are selling plants or not. There may or may not be a COOS orphans exhibit ... we should know by the October meeting date. Talk to **Bill Cavanaugh** or **Jon Young** and tell them if you need a sales table and also tell them they can count on you to work the show. Because we will have a few vendors at this show we will need a hospitality room and your sandwiches, casseroles and salads to feed them and the volunteers lunch and snacks.

## Tricks of the Trade – Easy Mounting

When I was a boy I used to fish a lot. I could tie a knot in monofilament fish line blindfolded with one hand! Now I can't do it with a magnifying glass. My solution is to use floral wire. I use 24 gauge green wire. Partially insert two small screws in the back of your mount (one at the top left, the other at the bottom right). There are no knots to tie. Simply twist the wire a couple of times around the top screw, wrap up your plant (with or without sphagnum moss) and twist again around the bottom screw.

## Creating an Orchid Exhibit 101

If you have never created an exhibit at an orchid show here are a few tips that I hope will encourage you to try it. What you will need:

1. Orchids in flower – it is usually recommended to use 1 orchid per square foot of your exhibit.
2. Some type of material to cover the pots the orchids are in and to cover any parts of your exhibit area. Typically black cloth is used, but you can be creative.
3. Small boxes of different sizes – these are used under the orchids so the exhibit has different levels. These will need to be covered as well.



4. Possibly a few tables if the exhibit is 25 square feet or more. If the exhibit size you request is a table or half table, the table is always provided at our shows.

5. Foliage plant – used for filler and to give the exhibit a natural appearance.

6. Name tags for each plant – These should be nicely printed and easily read from 3-4 feet away. Many people prefer the use of black construction paper as it does not distract the eye when viewing the exhibit as a whole. If the society is using a computerized registration, these may be printed and provided by them.

7. Backdrop – this is not always necessary, check with the show chair to see where your exhibit will be located. This will help you to determine if it is necessary. There are many approaches to creating exhibits. But I am proof that you do not have to be very creative to exhibit your orchids. Here is my formula in case you need a starting point:

When you first arrive at the show, put up your backdrop, tables (if needed), tablecloths, unpack your orchids and sort them by color (most people recommend arranging them by color), determine which orchid or group of orchids you would like to use as your focal point. Locate them where you want to draw the viewers' eyes and then arrange the other orchids around them based on their color.

At this point you can determine what orchids could use boxes under them to give the height needed to add the desired levels to the exhibit. You will probably need to move some of the orchids to get the boxes in so take a mental picture as to where they are so you can remember. Once you get all the boxes in place be sure to cover them, so they will not be visible and then put the orchids back in their new locations.



Once you are happy with where the plants are located, add your filler foliage plants and the material to cover all of the pots. If the orchids are in terra cotta pots or nice pots, they do not need to be covered. Make sure your plant tags that are in the pots are pushed down so they are out of sight. At this point I usually like to add sphagnum moss to soften up the exhibit. If you have no more changes, add the exhibit plant tags that will inform the viewers of the plants name and of course make sure you have registered the orchids and then you are done.

By the way we are proposing a workshop on registering your orchids for a show at a future meeting, if our new program chair thinks it worthwhile. Sound off if the idea appeals to you. If you have never setup an exhibit our Fall show is the ideal time to do so as the exhibit sizes are usually a little smaller (just full tables and half tables – you can get by on five to eight plants) thus easier to start with. We have plenty of black cloth for our members to borrow for use in their exhibits. If you have any questions about setting up an exhibit, please ask our experts. A few names that come to mind are Ken and Dawn Mettler, Screll Jones, Naila Caruso and Don Weber.
